Children were often evacuated out of the city and into the countryside. Please look carefully at the two pictures below and compare and contrast them. Imagine what they would have been like during the War.



Which place would you prefer to live in during WW2 and why


The coastguard thinks that the German pilots are using the lighthouse to locate their position and therefore it should be taken down. Is this the right thing to do? Yes or no?
