when the adverbial word or phrase is moved to the front of the sentence, before the verb.

Fronted Adverbials are words or phrases at the beginning of a sentence which are used to describe the action that follows.

- **Sense** (words missed out, missing subjects, unclear meaning).
- **Spelling.** (Are you sure 'that word' is correct?
CHECK IT!)
- **Punctuation.** (Comma splices, missing full stops, inaccurate parenthesis)
- **Paragraphing.** (TiP ToP)
- **Have we hit ALL of our success criteria?**
