Why did the Great Fire eventually stop?



- Houses in London's streets were built very close together and made from wood.
 Many of these houses had been pulled down to stop the fire spreading between them.
- The wind had stopped so it wasn't spreading the fire anymore.
- In some areas, the ground was so hot it took several days before people could walk there again!
- At least 65,000 people were left homeless and without their belongings. London needed to be rebuilt.

King Charles II made a speech to the people of London; the details are this declaration from 1666. he praised the courage of the people who tried to put out the fire. He also said that he wanted to rebuild the city and make plans to ensure another disaster like this could not happen again.

- In October 1666, King Charles appointed architects including Sir Christopher Wren, to start rebuilding London.
- · Some streets were widened or straightened.
- All houses had to be constructed of brick, though some use of wood was allowed in practice. The grander houses sometimes had doorways and windows in stone. Some are still present in London today (see picture).
- It was made easier to get water from the River Thames to the houses close by.
